Manuscript Submission

- All research articles should be sent as electronic attachments to the Editor, *International Research Journal of Arts & Humanities, University of Sindh, Pakistan, on the e-mail addresses given below.*

- On a 3½" floppy diskette or CD-ROM in MS Word for Windows or PDF format on the following address:
Secretary Editorial Board IRJAH, Department of English, University of Sindh, Jamshoro.
- Please include your phone, fax number, e-mail address, and postal address on the title page.
- Matter should be typed double-spaced throughout (including footnotes, quotations and reference list) with no less than one-inch margin on all four sides.
- "Times New Roman" must be adopted with 12-pt font size.
- All the headings and sub-headings should be in the font 14.

Abstract

- Each paper submitted for publication should be accompanied by an abstract of not more than 250 words summarizing the overall concept of the article.

Quotations

- While making reference to someone else's idea, either through paraphrasing or quoting them directly, the author's name along with the year of publication and page number must be provided for example:
'Efficient reading does not result from precise perception and identification of all elements, but from skill in selecting the fewest, most productive cues necessary to produce guesses' (Goodman 1967:127)

References

- All sources included in the 'References' section must be cited in the body of the paper and all sources cited in the paper must be included in the 'References' section for example:
Chaudron, C. (1988) *Second language classrooms: research on teaching and learning*. Cambridge: Cambridge University Press
- The list of references should be on a separate paper, arranged in alphabetical order by surnames of authors.

Bamford, J., & Day, R. R. (1998). Teaching Reading. *Annual Review of Applied Linguistics*, 18, 124-141.

Chaudron, C. (1988) *Second language classrooms: research on teaching and learning*. Cambridge: Cambridge University Press
Freire, P. (1993) *Pedagogy of the oppressed*. Harmondsworth: Penguin.
- The reference must be given in the following way;
To cite books or chapters in a book, refer to the following.
To cite magazine, newspaper, or professional journal articles, refer to the following.

- “Title of Newspaper or Magazine Article With No Author Listed, Title in Quotation Marks.” Name of Magazine or Newspaper, Underlined or Italicized. Day Month Year: page numbers.
- Marija Gimbutas (1973). “The Beginning of the Bronze Age in Europe and the Indo-Europeans: 3500-2500 B.C.” *Journal of Indo-European Studies*, Volume 1, p. 163.

Note: If you're citing an article or a publication that was originally issued in print form but that you retrieved from an online database, you should provide enough information so that the reader can locate the article either in its original print form or retrieve it from the online database (if they have access).
